Dear Friends in Christ:

Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, praising God and having the goodwill of all the people. And day by day the Lord added to their number those who were being saved. -Acts 2:46-47-

After the account of
Pentecost, which some
scholars suggest was the
beginning of the church, we
see from the quote above
from Acts how the Apostles
responded to the event of
wind, tongues of fire. This
quote often defines what it
may mean to be a member of
the church. It is about
spending time together,
breaking bread, that is
fellowship, and praise of
God or worship.

The landscape of this is so much different today than it was then. For years people gathered in homes. This was not just because of limited resources to build a gathering place. This may have been a practical thing.

We know that after the resurrection the disciples huddled behind locked doors out of fear. That may also have been a factor in gathering in secluded safe places.

With the pandemic we found such gathering places also a matter of safety.

When all is said and done however there is no substitute to gathering, breaking bread together and sharing fellowship and the Word. Acts tells us it is the Lord who "added to their numbers those who were being saved". This happened apart from their and our efforts, and sometimes even when their attempts seem unproductive. So too it is with you and I today.

Membership in the church has been defined as "those baptized persons on the roll of a congregation". Too often membership is confusing. There are assumptions based on certain factors. For example, if a person, who is not a member of a particular congregation, marries a member of the congregation are they automatically a member. How are we added day by day?

Let us explore some of these issues. Keep in mind that the goal is to affirm participation and practice and inclusion despite external circumstances and previous misconceptions and misunderstandings. Membership is a guide and is there for the purpose of order not to label or judge a person's status within the community. Members are classified as Baptized, Confirmed, Voting and Associate.

A baptized member is one received by baptism into the congregation or in previous congregations and then received by transfer or affirmation of faith. Baptism is into the Christian faith, not into a specific congregation, and is accepted for the most part universally.

A confirmed member is a baptized member who has taken instruction in a particular congregation/denomination and has affirmed that expression of the faith or has transferred from another congregation of the same expression of faith.

A voting member is a confirmed member who has both communed and contributed during the preceding year.

An associate member is person holding membership in other Lutheran/Christian congregations but who wish to retain such membership but desire to participate in the life and mission of this congregation. A good example of this is members who go south for the winter and take part in congregations where they live during that time.

The privilege and duty of members is to make regular use of the Word and Sacrament, attend worship, live a Christian life, support the congregation and church at large through contributions of time, talents and abilities. Most importantly however the church exists not to make or gain members but to make disciples that was the charge of our Lord in Matthew 28.
