TYPE OF WORSHIP

GOVERNMENT

Modified episcopal

No prescribed form, although congregational in U.S.

CHARACTERISTICS.

Major emphasis on Christian living as a result of Christian experience. Emphasis on individual interpretation of doctrine: "In essentials unity, in non-essentials liberty, in all things charity." Leaders in all major movements for cooperation.

Christian living seen as an expression of Christian faith.

Strong emphasis on doctrine. Cautious about cooperative movements, but aware and involved for
wide ministry.

It is not the largest of denominations but one of the few worldwide churches. In 2000 the ELCA and the Moravian Church entered into full communion. It is they who claim the challenge of transcending all differences including political systems and skin color. During the Reformation contact was made with Martin Luther while it already supported over 175,000 Moravians. Known as the Unita's Fratrum or Unity of Brothers such contact with the Reformer lead to the publication of its confession of faith with Luther himself writing the preface.

The unique contribution of the Moravian Church is that it has maintained a worldwide unity since the 18th century. It embraces over nineteen provinces and missions located on every major continent. The church is strong in Tanzania as well as South Africa, Surinam, Guyana, the West Indies, Central America, Europe, the United Kingdom, and North America.

It began when a Bohemian priest/scholar John Hus, was burned at the stake at the Council of Constance in 1415. Failure to purify the existing church the followers organized their own body in 1457. The Unity, as it was called, prospered, and soon was persecuted only to be reborn. A band of refugees from Bohemia were permitted to settle on the lands by Count Zinzendorf under whose leadership they worshiped as Lutherans in the parish church.

Their worship is varied offering freedom of expression. There is a deep relationship between the Moravian church and Lutheran Pietism as well as Christian living. Their over riding principal is, "in essentials unity, in non-essentials liberty and in all things charity."
